A MESSAGE FROM LEADERSHIP

Reflecting back on the past year, 2025 will be remembered as year of change for the Greater Wyoming Valley Area YMCA. Each branch grew in its own way while the association added Jeremy Popiel as Chief Operating Officer and Lucy Musto as Chief Development Officer. Those two positions are vital to the continued growth of our association.

Wilkes-Barre adapted its locker room to accommodate the faster-paced, in-and-out member via the universal locker room. The new design is a way to maximize space while retaining individual privacy. Both the men's and women's locker rooms were upgraded with the addition of a red-light therapy sauna, new showers, new sinks, larger lockers and more!

Pittston upgraded the locker room as well, grew its membership base and welcomed a new director in Josh Lukaszewski. The building physically connected to the Y was purchased through a Neighborhood Assistance Program (NAP) grant with the help of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The expansion will support the development of the Pittston YMCA Early Childcare Education Center, a project that will expand access to affordable, high-quality early childhood education while revitalizing a central downtown property. Once complete, the project will create new classrooms serving 40 additional infants and toddlers ages six weeks to three years, helping address long-standing childcare shortages for families in the Pittston area.

The Hazleton YMCA reopened early in 2025, welcoming the Pasco L. Schiavo Early Learning Center. The child care center is the first step in bringing a full-functioning YMCA back to Hazleton, mostly through the generous contributions of Rob and Kim Mericle, whose generosity and vision made the project possible. Located at 75 South Church Street, the Hazleton Y has been renamed in honor of the family - the Mericle Family Center YMCA. The Hazleton location has undergone extensive renovations thanks to the Mericle family, who contributed more than \$5 million in capital and program funding for the project. The second phase of construction is set to wrap up in 2026 with the full YMCA opening to the public.

The Freeland YMCA became the final branch of the Y in Luzerne County to join the Greater Wyoming Valley Area YMCA in November. The heart of Freeland since 1899, the building will continue to give Freeland children a place to play, learn and grow. Freeland director, Jim Laputka, helped secure grant funding for a new roof and remodeled exterior as well as a remodeling of the interior of the gym. A STEM education classroom was recently created for children to learn coding, web design and 3D printing skills. A preschool classroom was also added to bring accessible and affordable childcare to the borough.

Through all this change, the Greater Wyoming Valley Area YMCA has built a solid foundation upon which we can strengthen communities across Luzerne County in 2026 and beyond.

2025 EVENTS

The Greater Wyoming Valley Area YMCA held its 161st Annual Meeting at Fox Hill Country Club on Feb. 19, honoring Kevin O'Boyle (departing BOD President), Cheryl Connolly (incoming BOD President), Stephanie Bewley & Nick Pincin (five-year service award) and Linda Reilly (Legacy Award).



The Greater Pittston YMCA raised \$11,834 in donations by 187 riders during its annual Spin-a-Thon event on March 8.

On April 12, 94 runners helped raise \$4,053 for YMCA Camp Kresge Scholarships.

PROJECT: BLUE SKY OUTDOOR EDUCATION

Blue Sky Outdoor Education is an approved Educational Improvement Organization (EIO) program, part of Pennsylvania’s Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) program. Blue Sky Field Trips during the Spring and Fall seasons include up to three classes chosen by their teachers to support the concepts that students are learning about in their classrooms. Participants receive a full day of activities, as well as a healthy hot lunch and snack. We’ve found that schools, teachers, and students appreciate the time the children get to spend outdoors learning in Blue Sky’s non-traditional environment.



“Our third-grade class had an amazing field trip to Camp Kresge, where students participated in engaging and educational science classes that were both informative and interactive. The hands-on activities allowed the students to explore the outdoors, deepening their understanding of nature. HAZLETON YMCA



The Hazleton YMCA officially became part of the Greater Wyoming Valley Area YMCA on January 31, 2025, when community members gathered to celebrate the opening of a child care facility – the Pasco L. Schiavo Early Learning Center. The classrooms were the first phase of reopening the Hazleton Y, which was renamed the Mericle Family Center due to the work of the Mericle family in bringing a YMCA back to Hazleton after the branch was forced to close due to financial difficulties in 2019.



Phase two of the construction project is set to finish in April 2026 with the full YMCA reopening in the summer.



FREELAND YMCA



The Freeland Y officially became part of the Greater Wyoming Valley Area YMCA on November 3 – a move “made for the greater good... to keep a Y in Freeland.”



Launched a state-licensed Keystone Star Level 1 Childcare Program for 10 children, which is currently at capacity.



Completed \$400,000 roof replacement, gym renovation and \$140,000 front façade repairs of deteriorating masonry



Successfully launched a STEM education program, offering 3D printing, web design, coding and LEGO Robotics Summer Program that served 13 children at no cost to their families



POWER SCHOLARS ACADEMY

Power Scholars Academy is a six week full-day program targeting summer learning loss prevention. During the summer of 2025, 151 youth were served at Bear Creek Community Charter School, helping them get ahead on math and reading skills.



Power Scholars Academy students receive a free breakfast, lunch, and 90 minutes of math/ literacy in the morning and afternoon enrichment. Children enjoyed STEM and coding instruction as well as outdoor activities. This year, PSA visited the Lehigh Valley Zoo (pictures below).

COMMUNITY IMPACT

SENIOR TECH HELP

Senior Tech Help expanded in 2025 and is now offered at the Wilkes-Barre and Pittston Y's. Staff and volunteers provided 117 hours of one-on-one tech help, serving 64 unique seniors. Seniors set up new phones, learned about AI, and transitioned to apple watches. The King's College Computer and Information Services Club donated over 50 hours of service in October and November. The program is supported by Comcast.

FOOD & FUN AT THE PARK SUMMER FEEDING PROGRAM

This program brings together municipalities and community organizations to provide free meals, snacks and summer supervision at locations throughout Luzerne County. In 2025, the program provided lunches at five locations in Wilkes-Barre (Miner Park, Hollenback Park, the YMCA, Mineral Springs Village and Boulevard Townhomes. The Y partnered with the respective boroughs to provide supervision, lunches and snacks at Charles Street Playground and Healey Playground in Duryea.

LEGO ROBOTICS

The YMCA installed a LEGO Robotics Program in 2024, in just over a year it has built a team of 29 participants in Wilkes-Barre. The program in Pittston drew 59 participants over the summer while working with the Summer OFF children. Another 13 participants adopted the program in Freeland.

REACHING BEYOND LIMITS

Reaching Beyond Limits is a workforce development program for special needs teens and young adults to learn job skills and build social skills within the workforce. Nine RBL helpers, assisted by their job coaches, fed students in the Food & Fun program this summer. RBL youth assisted with bi-weekly food distributions for families. When all sites were in operation, RBL at the YMCA Food & Fun program made, assembled and packed over 250 lunches and 250 snacks daily. Careerlink/Luzerne Schuylkill Workforce Investment Board also supported the program by providing eight park site attendants that worked with the Y's park site supervisors.

FRIDAY FRIENDS


Supported by the Gregory Center and the Earthly Angel Autism Fund, the Pittston Y offers a free swimming and pizza program on the fourth Friday of each month. This program provides neurodivergent youth and their families opportunities to connect and belong.



In addition, the Pittston Y offers free lessons for more than 20 Gregory Center families as the mission of the Y's swim program is to provide water safety training for all. YMCA CHRONIC DISEASE PREVENTION PROGRAMS



The Diabetes Prevention Program is a one-year, lifestyle modification program that assists adults at-risk for type two diabetes. Thanks to the American Lung Association the Y was able to run **four** sessions in 2025, helping more than **27** people reduce their risk for type two diabetes. **Participants lost an average of 8.2 lbs.**



The Arthritis Foundation Aquatic Program was utilized 3,079 times in Pittston and 3,433 times in Wilkes-Barre for a **total of 6,512 individual sessions in 2025.**



Co-Pilot Senior Memberships are provided to individuals 60+ and funded by the Area Agency for Aging. The Y offers 10 classes in Wilkes-Barre and nine classes in Pittston weekly. **Strong and Balanced, GeriFit and the Arthritis Foundation Aquatics Program serve 100+ each month. The Greater Wyoming Valley Area YMCA added more than 70 new Co-Pilot Senior Memberships in 2025.**



Many older adults develop a fear of falling. People who develop this fear often limit their activities, which can result in physical weakness, making the risk of falling even greater. A **Matter of Balance** is a program designed to reduce the fear of falling and increase activity levels among older adults. **The YMCA was able to help 35 seniors improve their mobility through this program this year.**

The YMCA Staff was able to add a new staff member to assist with evidence-based exercise and community nutrition while existing staff obtained new certifications to host additional programming in AFAP/AFEP classes. Combining resources between the GWVA YMCA association and the Freeland Y allowed two team members to gain the certifications necessary to run evidence-based exercise classes in Freeland in 2026!






Donations by Gift Type




Donors by Membership Status




Donations by Type



Number of Donations by Gift Size




